Position Summary:

Applications are invited for a two-year fixed-term appointment as Lecturer/Assistant Professor in Creative and Cultural Industries in the School of Art History and Cultural Policy. The successful candidate will work closely with School staff and the Creative Futures Academy (UCD, IADT, NCAD) to deliver the new BA Humanities in Creative and Cultural Industries. This is a new four-year degree at UCD that blends the breadth and richness of an arts and humanities degree with innovation, organisational, digital and management skills. Combining project-based work with high-level career mentorship, this programme prepares students for careers as cultural entrepreneurs, producers, and creative practitioners. This is an exciting opportunity to help shape a new and evolving programme at UCD, in concert with a wide range of colleagues across Colleges of Arts & Humanities, Social Science & Law, and Business.

This programme has been developed across six Schools and three Colleges at UCD, led by the School of Art History and Cultural Policy, which also delivers the highly successful MA in Arts Management & Cultural Policy. The post is funded by the HEA Human Capital Initiative (2020-2025), a programme intended to augment the delivery of creative education at all stages, in collaboration with sectoral and industry partners, via the Creative Futures Academy initiative: <https://creativefuturesacademy.ie/>.

Role:

You will be a core member of the Creative & Cultural Industries teaching and research team, contributing enthusiastically to our teaching programme and care of our undergraduate cohort, and taking administrative responsibility as Programme Coordinator. This role includes acting as students' first point of contact for academic enquiries; providing pastoral care and academic guidance; and coordinating recruitment and social media engagement for the programme, alongside other School staff members who are part of the CCI coordination team. You'll be delivering/team-teaching 3 modules annually (primarily at BA level, but potentially MA level also). You will also be expected to engage with School, college, university, and cross-institutional initiatives as part of the Creative Futures Academy. Creative practice at UCD is characterised by its strong links to the creative and cultural industries in Dublin, Ireland and beyond. The successful candidate would be expected to augment and develop these partnerships. You will also be expected to pursue your area of research and/or creative practice specialisation, contributing to the dynamic, research-driven, and outwardly-engaged culture of the School and College. This will also include dissertation supervision at the BA and MA level.

Skills, experience, and qualifications:

We seek applicants with strong teaching and administration experience at third level, who have the demonstrated capacity to mentor new students, and take leadership on the programme's coordination, recruitment, and outreach efforts. Applicants should also have experience as a creative practitioner or manager, with a proven track record of achievement in the creative industries (either non- or for-profit); or experience in practice as research at third level.

Essential to the role is the ability to teach courses in your area of specialisation, as well as broader introductory courses on the creative and cultural industries, and contribute to team-taught modules. We seek a dynamic and engaging communicator who has the ability to inspire our diverse students, and guide them in their aspirations to work in the creative and cultural industries, both in Ireland and/or internationally.

This post is open to postgraduate-level qualified candidates (PhD preferred) from a range of artistic and creative backgrounds. However, we will prioritise candidates with experience in sectors not already represented amongst programme staff, including (but not excluded to) fashion; gaming / game theory; television and screen studies; music production; marketing and advertising; new media and digital practice; design; globalisation and the creative industries; etc.

Principal Duties and Responsibilities:

- Develop and deliver courses in the creative and cultural industries as part of the taught programme
- Assume role of Programme Coordinator for the new BA in Creative and Cultural Industries
- Contribute to existing modules at undergraduate and postgraduate level, and make a significant contribution to curriculum development and development of new pedagogies
- Contribute to and enhance the development of the Creative Futures Academy, including where appropriate to work in collaboration with institutional and organisational partners
- Enhance the creative portfolio of the UCD School of Art History and Cultural Policy
- Supervise undergraduate and postgraduate projects and theses
- Contribute as required to the administration and management of UCD School of Art History and Cultural Policy as assigned by the Head of School.

Selection Criteria:

Selection criteria outline the qualifications, skills, knowledge and/or experience that the successful candidate would need to demonstrate for successful discharge of the responsibilities of the post. Applications will be assessed on the basis of how well candidates satisfy these criteria.

Mandatory:

- PhD or equivalent demonstrated through robust evidence of appropriate research, innovation, or creative activity appropriate for the discipline
- A strong and visible track record as a creative and critical practitioner, with detailed plans for the future
- An undergraduate and postgraduate qualification in a relevant discipline, preferably to PhD level
- A research/teaching specialisation extending beyond existing strengths in the School/College
- Significant experience of teaching at third level
- Significant experience of administration at third level, including pastoral care of students
- A demonstrated ability to work collaboratively
- Excellent administrative and interpersonal skills.
- Strong working knowledge and experience with social media and digital platforms
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- Candidates must demonstrate how they can positively contribute to fostering an inclusive environment and a level of awareness of equality, diversity and inclusion.

Desirable:

- The ability to offer expertise and teaching in broad areas of the creative and cultural industries
- Experience of working in partnership with a broad range of creative industries and organisations
- Experience working in student recruitment

Athena SWAN at UCD

University College Dublin has received its second Athena SWAN Bronze institutional award in recognition of the university’s work towards gender equality. | Eligibility to compete and certain restrictions on eligibility | |
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| Incentivised Scheme for Early Retirement (ISER): | It is a condition of the Incentivised Scheme for Early Retirement (ISER) as set out in Department of Finance Circular 12/09 that retirees, under that Scheme, are debarred from applying for another position in the same employment or the same sector. Therefore, such retirees may not apply for this position |
| Department of Health and Children Circular (7/2010): | The Department of Health Circular 7/2010 dated 1 November 2010 introduced a Targeted Voluntary Early Retirement (VER) Scheme and Voluntary Redundancy Schemes (VRS). It is a condition of the VER scheme that persons availing of the scheme will not be eligible for re-employment in the public health sector or in the wider public service or in a body wholly or mainly funded from public moneys. The same prohibition on re-employment applies under the VRS, except that the prohibition is for a period of 7 years, after which time any re-employment will require the approval of the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform. People who availed of either of these schemes are not eligible to complete in this competition. |
| Collective Agreement - Redundancy Payments to Public Servants: | The Department of Public Expenditure and Reform letter dated 28th June 2012 to Personnel Officers introduced, with effect from 1st June 2012, a Collective Agreement which had been reached between the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform and the Public Services Committee of the ICTU in relation to ex-gratia Redundancy Payments to Public Servants. It is a condition of the Collective Agreement that persons availing of the agreement will not be eligible for re-employment in the public service by any public service body (as defined by the Financial Emergency Measures in the Public Interest Acts 2009 – 2011) for a period of 2 years from termination of the employment. Thereafter the consent of the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform will be required prior to re- |

People who availed of this scheme and who may be successful in this competition will have to prove their eligibility (expiry of period of non-eligibility) and the Minister's consent will have to be secured prior to employment by any public service body.</p> |
| <p>Declaration:</p> | <p>Applicants will be required to sign a Pre-Employment Declaration to confirm whether they have previously availed of a public service scheme of incentivised early retirement and/or the collective agreement outlined above. The above represents the main schemes and agreements restricting a candidate's right to be re-employed in the public service. However it is not intended to be an exhaustive list and candidates should declare details of any other exit mechanism they have availed of which restricts their right to be re-employed in the public service. Applicants will also be required to declare any entitlements to a Public Service pension benefit (in payment or preserved) from any other Public Service employment and/or where they have received a payment-in-lieu in respect of service in any Public Service employment.</p> |
| <p>Superannuation and Retirement:</p> | <p>The successful candidate will be offered the appropriate superannuation terms and conditions as prevailing in the University, at the time of being offered an appointment. In general, and except for candidates who have worked in a pensionable (non-single scheme terms) public service job in the 26 weeks prior to appointment (see paragraph d below), this means being offered an appointment based on membership of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme").</p> <p>Key provisions attaching to membership of the Single Scheme are as follows:</p> |
| <p><i>a. Pensionable Age</i> - The minimum age at which pension is payable is 66 in line with State Pension age changes.</p> <p><i>b. Retirement Age</i> - Scheme members must retire at the age of 70.</p> <p><i>c. Pension Abatement:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If the appointee was previously employed in the Civil Service or in the Public Service please note that the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012 includes a provision which extends abatement of pension for all Civil and Public Servants who are re-employed where a Public Service pension is in payment. This provision to apply abatement across the wider public service came into effect on 1 November 2012. This may have pension implications for any person appointed to this position who is currently in receipt of a Civil or Public Service pension or has a preserved Civil or Public Service pension which will come into payment during his/her employment in this position. • Department of Education and Skills Early Retirement Scheme for Teachers Circular 102/2007 <p>The Department of Education and Skills introduced an Early Retirement Scheme for Teachers. It is a condition of the Early Retirement Scheme that with the exception of the situations set out in paragraphs 10.2 and 10.3 of the relevant circular documentation, and with those exceptions only, if a teacher accepts early retirement under Strands 1, 2 or 3 of this scheme and is subsequently employed in any capacity in any area of the public sector, payment of pension to that person under the scheme will immediately cease. Pension payments will, however, be resumed on the ceasing of such employment or on the person's 60th birthday, whichever is the later, but on resumption, the pension will be based on the person's actual reckonable service as a teacher (i.e. the added years previously granted will not be taken into account in the calculation of the pension payment).</p> • Ill-Health-Retirement <p>Please note that where an individual has retired from a Civil/Public Service body on the grounds of ill-health his/her pension from that employment may be subject to review in accordance with the rules of ill-health retirement within the pension scheme of that employment.</p> <p><i>d. Prior Public Servant</i> - While the default pension terms, as set out in the preceding paragraphs, consist of Single Scheme membership, this may not apply to certain appointees. Full details of the conditions governing whether or not a public servant is a Single Scheme member are given in the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and other</p> | |

Provisions) Act 2012. However the key exception case (in the context of this competition and generally) is that a successful candidate who has worked in a pensionable (non-single scheme terms) capacity in the public service within 26 weeks of taking up appointment, would in general not become a member of the Single Scheme. In this case such a candidate would instead be offered membership of the UCD Pension Scheme. This would mean that the abatement provisions at (c) above would apply, and in addition there are implications in respect of pension accrual as outlined below:

e. Pension Accrual - A 40-year limit on total service that can be counted towards pension where a person has been a member of more than one existing public service pension scheme would apply. This 40-year limit, which is provided for in the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and other Provisions) Act 2012 came into effect on 28 July 2012. This may have implications for any appointee who has acquired pension rights in a previous public service employment.

f. Pension-Related Deduction - This appointment is subject to the pension-related deduction in accordance with the Financial Emergency Measure in the Public Interest Act 2009.
